Gordon Family Cemetery

The origin of the Gordon Family Cemetery started with the death of Eliza Kerr "Gordon" LeSueur, the daughter of Andrew and Eliza "Goff" Gordon. She died January 11, 1855¹ and was the first to be buried back behind the main house. It was originally thought that she had probably died during the delivery of her daughter. But this has been proven to be wrong. Her daughter survived, married² and moved to Grand Coteau, St. Landry Parish, Louisiana. Her name was Eliza Penelope LeSueur. Her father, Charles Marion LeSueur, represented Milam and Robertson Counties in the Texas Legislature in 1857 and 1858³. He was a member of the 1861 Texas Secession Convention and signed the ordinance of Texas Secession, as a representative of Milam and Williamson Counties. He was a Lieutenant Colonel during the War Between the States and is buried in the Presbyterian Cemetery in Georgetown, Texas.

Around 1854, Andrew and his wife, Eliza, brought their family to Texas by way of Pulaski, Giles Co., Tennessee⁴ – Newton County, Mississippi⁵, then here to Williamson County. Andrew bought 453 acres of the Conrad Eigenauer grant February 6, 1854⁶. Then on March 3, 1854 Andrew bought an additional 320 acres of the Pedro Garza grant⁷.

The Gordon family continued to add burials to the cemetery. Some of Andrew and Eliza's children and grandchildren are buried here. The oldest person buried here is John Goff, Eliza's father, who was born in 1776 and died in 1867⁸. The youngest buried here is shared by twin daughters of Thomas and Nancy Lane, who were born and died September 11, 1873⁹.

In his last Will and Testament, Andrew Gordon decreed the following:

"... I direct and will that out of the aforesaid lands, a lot of the dimensions of 75 feet square, including my family burial ground near my dwelling, be and the same is hereby reserved and set apart especially and perpetually for a family cemetery, and in no event shall the same be sold, transferred or conveyed to any one by any of my Heirs or legatees. Said 75 feet square of land, for the purposes of a family burying ground as aforesaid and for the preservation of the graves already there on is meted and bounded as follows,"

Signed on the 13 day of October 1882. 10

Andrew died June 24, 1889, but as yet his grave has not been found. Presently there are fifteen marked graves in a very small cemetery, hidden from view behind the main house.... trees and heavy brush.

Fact is, that the old house still stands. It is a two-story house with large white pillars in front with a gallery for both floors. The house was built with square nails and these have not been replaced. The floor sills are six inches by ten inches and one is made of solid black walnut. The house had two rooms upstairs and two downstairs. There is a fireplace in each room and a winding stairway between the two floors. The house took one year to build and is approximately 160 years old. The lumber was hauled from Houston by oxen.¹¹

Gordon, Gordon family member. The deed records reflect that you are the owner of property that shares common borders with the cemetery. Cemeteries that are deemed worthy of recognition and preservation for their age and historical significance are eligible for this designation. The four-page Historic Texas Cemetery application form has provided us with a narrative history and photographs of the cemetery, and documentation defining its boundaries. Upon review and approval of the application, the Texas Historical Commission will supply the applicant with an *Affidavit of Dedication for Cemetery Purposes* to be recorded in the deed records in the Williamson County Clerk's office. A copy of the *Affidavit of Dedication for Cemetery Purposes* will be sent to you for your information.

This designation does not restrict in any way your use of the land adjacent to or surrounding this historic cemetery. Any cemetery or burial site in Texas, whether designated as a Historic Texas Cemetery or not, may not be disturbed, desecrated, or have gravestones removed under existing state laws. A brief description of some of the Texas laws regarding cemeteries is included in the enclosed THC booklet titled *Texas Preservation Guidelines - Preserving Historic Cemeteries*.

It is our hope that this designation will encourage long-term preservation of this unique resource through its recordation in the deed records. Please note that if the 12 X 16 inch interpretive plaque is not sufficient to display the desired text for your cemetery we do currently offer the somewhat awkward addition of a second plaque of the same size to allow for more text. The two would be mounted one over the other. This limitation in our offering is due to contract constraints with the foundry that are in effect through August of this year. We will be renewing our contract with the foundry in September and hope to change this situation. Therefore, please note that as of September 1st, 2001, we expect to be able to offer the option of purchasing a 16 X 24 inch interpretive plaque. Also available will be the purchase of a post from the foundry to go with the medallions and plaques. The cost of this new size plaque has not been finalized but we expect it to be in the range of roughly double the cost of the 12 X 16 inch plaque that is now set at \$225.00. The additional charge for a post will likely be around \$50.00.

You may want to consider the above options as you are planning your order. If you prefer that more information be displayed than can be accommodated on the current size plaque (15 lines, 39 spaces per line) and you do not want the look of two plaques that is now available, we suggest that you wait to place your order until September. The availability of posts from the foundry may also be a consideration for your order. If you do prefer to wait until September to place an order, we can still begin working with you on the text of the plaque so that it is ready to go once the new contract goes into effect. Early on when I first found the cemetery I found that it was called GARDEN cemetery. I tried at that time to get the name of it changed to GORDON cemetery. Often when someone asks me my name they mistake me saying Garden, but it's obvious to me that just didn't hear me correctly. Someone, way back when, mistook the name the same as they do now in modern days. Unfortunately, I haven't been able to get it to what it should be named, GORDON Cemetery. I simply didn't know what to do.

As for Mr. Bullion, I called him last night shortly after he had arrived from work. He's very upset and thinks that the cemetery will now be opened to the public. I tried to explain to him that it isn't, wasn't and never will be a public cemetery. I also tried to explain to him that he doesn't have to do anything to make it easier for me or other family members to visit the cemetery. He was afraid that the Historical Commission or I was going to force him into making a road to get in and out by. Not only was that never my intention but I tried also to explain that it's not yours either. At the same time I was explaining all of this to Mr. Bullion, I told him that he doesn't even have to allow me to visit the cemetery but twice a year if he so chooses. I may have shot myself in the foot with that but I wanted to try to put him at ease with all of this. Right now I still have a great deal of work to do out there before the cemetery can be called "saved". Cattle have been known to roam into the cemetery so I wanted to put up some sort of fence that I could afford. Most fences are quite expensive. Specially ones befitting an old cemetery like this one. I want to be able to straighten the tombstones that are either leaning or have fallen over. I don't have the first idea where to start with that. Some of the stones need to be repaired. Again, I have no idea how to do this without ruining something that has with stood so many years so far. And if Mr. Bullion gets a thorn....... well, nothing will ever be done and it'll only deteriorate further. He already has the two story 160 year plus house being rented and gradually deteriorating beyond repair along with many out buildings.

The last thing he asked me last night was, "just how are you related to Andrew Gordon?" I told him that he was my cousin, but I'm not sure Mr. Bullion could comprehend me having a cousin that was born in 1802. I had told him this before and even asked to buy the house and land around it including the run down out buildings. He gave me a definite "NO".



Gentlemen:

I have received copy of your Affidavit of Dedication in connection with the above captioned cemetery and wish to advise you that the name is incorrect. The cemetery was established by Mr. Andrew Gordon, who at one time owned the place which I now own and on which the cemetery is located. I feel sure that Maj. Gordon would probably turn over in his grave, if he knew the name under which the cemetery was dedicated. I inquire as to whether there is any way the name can be corrected.

The cemetery is located North of and in close proximity to the original residence of Maj. Gordon and which still stands and is in fairly good condition. I do not believe that any easement was reserved to furnish a means of ingress to and egress from such cemetery.

While I have no particular objection to members of the family coming onto my land to get to the cemetery. I have great concern for a roadway to be opened to the general public. The roadway would, of necessity, have to run either upon the East side or West side of the residence, and there are people living in the house. This could become quite a problem. Of course, this could also lead to a considerable amount of vandalism.

I assume that you are going to reply that notwithstanding the fact that no easement was reserved, that by some law the public would have the right to use my adjoining land as a means of ingress to and egress from said cemetery. If this is true, please furnish me with the applicable law on the matter.

In my opinion, having the cemetery designated as a historical cemetery and having the general public desiring to visit such cemetery greatly detracts from the value of my land, and naturally no one desires to have this happen.


